### What is your current job?

Court reporter (or transcriber), National Transcription Service, as well as some freelance work as an audio describer for blind and vision-impaired patrons at theatre/dance/musical performances.

### What is your highest degree (and major)? Where did you study?

Masters in Ancient History, University of Auckland.

### What drew you to Classical Studies, Ancient History, Egyptology, and/or ancient languages?

I loved Classics at school, because it involved studying ancient civilisations from a number of different perspectives - art, literature, philosophy, architecture etc - which really appealed to the generalist in me.

I don't know that Classics and Ancient History have specifically helped in my job search, but I think a lot of employers are impressed by the subject matter, and the degree evidences a valuable skill-set (see question 6).
